- John P. Comer -filmmake & Founder of The Architect of Justice
  - John P. Comer, MPA is a Senior Organizer with 20 years experience around housing and criminal justice issues. John has organized in various cities across the country, where he built neighborhood organizations from the ground-up through empowering residents in various communities.
- <u>Dayvon Love</u> Leaders of a Beautiful Struggle, Director of Public Policy
  - Dayvon Love is a Baltimore-based political organizer and the Director of Public Policy for Leaders of a Beautiful Struggle (LBS), a grassroots think-tank that advances the public policy interests of Black people. In 2010, Love co-founded Leaders of a Beautiful Struggle (LBS), one of many organizations that successfully pressured the state of Maryland to disband its plans to build a juvenile jail downtown.
- <u>NNEKA N'NAMDI</u> Fight Blight Bmore, Founder
  - Nneka N'namdi is Baltimore based entrepreneur engaged in social mission driven entrepreneurship and community wellness work. She endeavors to apply a mix of traditional African and modern African American social, economic and spiritual practices as a framework for living. As a member of The Living Well team she curates community space for artistic, economic and social ventures.
- <u>ALETHEIA R. McCASKILL</u> Maryland House Delegate
  - Aletheia McCaskill (<u>Democratic Party</u>) is a member of the <u>Maryland House of</u> <u>Delegates</u>, representing <u>District 44B</u>.Her career experience includes owning and directing Tender Tots, and working as a computer operator with Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center and a computer programmer/intermittent associate with the Department of Economic and Employment Development.

McCaskill has served as the vice president of the Early Learning Division of the Service Employees International Union Local 500.

- <u>Maxine Gross</u> College Park City-University Partnership/Lakeland Community
   Heritage Project
  - Maxine Gross is a fifth-generation member of College Park's historic African American community, Lakeland. Her family's contribution to the University of Maryland dates from the early 1900s with employment by her great uncle Ferdinand Hughes, great grandmother, grandfather (48 years) and father (28 years). She was the first of the family able to enroll at the University, completing a Bachelor of Arts degree. Maxine is the founding chairperson of the <u>Lakeland</u> <u>Community Heritage Project</u>.
